



The midday pause, which has been observed during the last six months in Capetown has now been discontinued. The photo shows the Mayor and ex-Mayor (who inaugurated the custom) standing on the balcony next to the four buglers, who blow the "Last Post," when men's hats were raised and a pause of two minutes was made by everyone. After a hymn had been sung the proceedings terminated. What a contrast between this and the midday service in Durban, which ceased on account of the "hunger" attendance, about a dozen being present on the last occasion, while business went on as usual.
