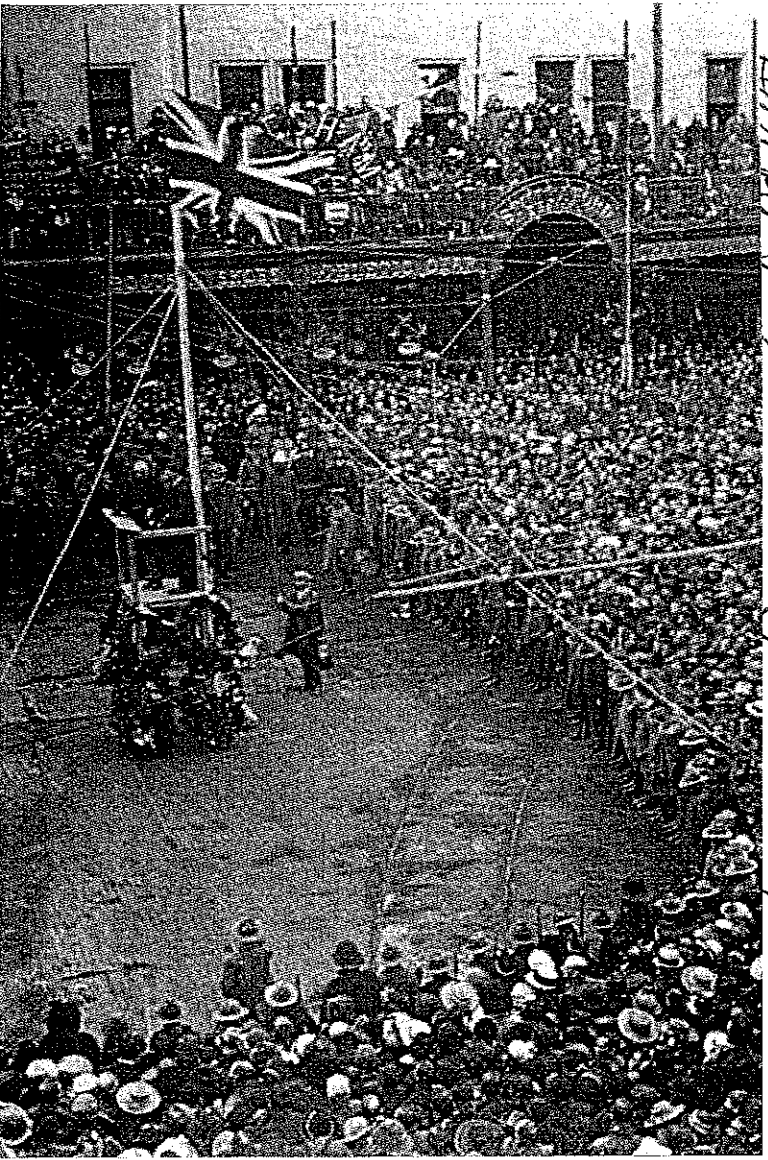

## ... LAST MIDDAY PAUSE IN CAPE TOWN ...

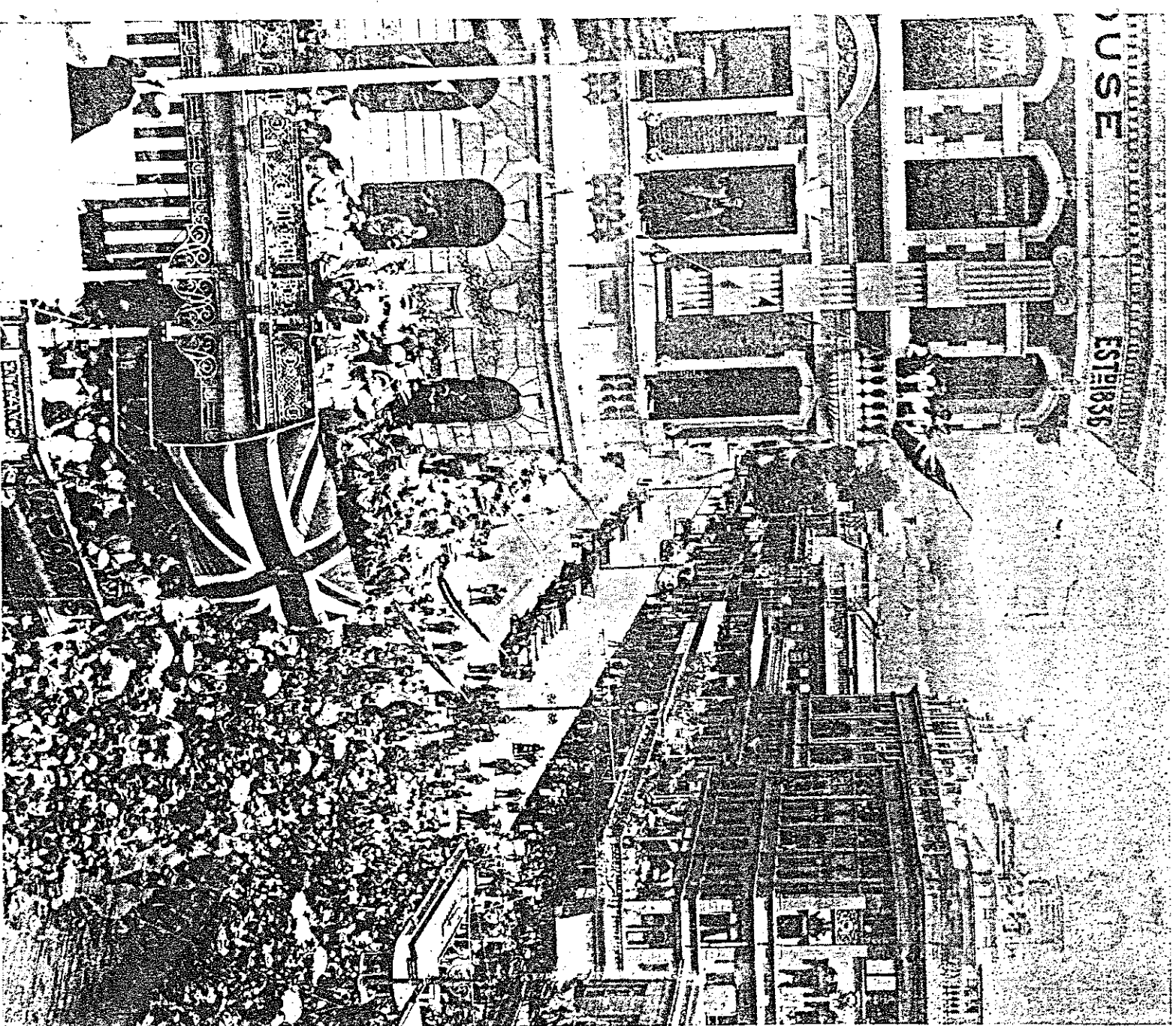

The photo shows the Mayor and ex-Mayor (who inaugurated the custom) standing on the balcony next to the four buglers, who blow the "Last Post," when men's hats were raised and a pause of two minutes was made by everyone. After a luncheon had been serving the proceedings terminated. What a contrast between this and the midday service in Durban, which ceased on account of the "huge" attendance, about a dozen being present on the last occasion, while business went on as usual.
